This has been a year of change and growth for Enniskillen Castle in many respects and we have ended the year on a high note, winning the Gulbenkian/Heritage Council award for Best Smaller Museum in Ireland for the second time.

The Museum has continued to work to high standards in traditional areas of collection management, documentation and research. We have also increased access and outreach by hosting a living history event on the May Day Bank Holiday in conjunction with the Environmental and

Heritage Service, holding a workshop for visiting Chernobyl children, hosting the Ulster Museum Science Bus and facilitating

Bus and facilitating an adult education evening entitled *Stop*, *Look & Listen*. This latter event

was in conjunction with the nation-wide Campaign for Learning. The Museum also took part in other nation wide events such as Museums Week and Gallery Week. Gallery Week was a particularly successful venture. The aim of this week was to encourage children to engage in the visual arts and during it the exhibition of Kathleen Bridle paintings acted as a spring board for children to explore water colour techniques.

Caring for our collections must always be carefully balanced with the need to provide access. A Collection Management Plan (1998-2001) was drawn up which will take the Museum into the next century. It addresses all relevant issues ranging from documentation, storage, conservation and environmental controls to planning for potential disasters and risk management.

Another undertaking was a reassessment of our existing education programme and education handling collection. The Museum aims to have a flexible and responsive approach to educational provision both for school groups and other users. To this end new programmes are currently being developed which explore Fermanagh's natural environment and interpret Enniskillen Castle as built evidence of the past.

Adult education has been served by various means including a Friends of the Museum trip to Co. Cavan, two art classes by Dr. Denise Ferran and various public lectures including one by Dr. Carole Durix on the subject of her aunt, Kathleen Bridle.

As always this year saw a range of special exhibitions - *New Sculpture*, a review of the recent work of local sculpture Anthony Scott and *Transformations* by photographer Anne Cassidy.

The exhibition programme was continued with Early Christianity in Ireland, which explored the material and cultural evidence of this important period in Ireland's history. Kathleen Bridle: Watercolourist and Landscape Painter (1897-1989), was a timely and important retrospective exhibition of her work which was accompanied by the book, The Life and Art of Kathleen Bridle.

September opened with Shay
Nethercott's Fermanagh: An
Exhibition of Photographs which
allowed another important
review of a life's work. The
year's programme ended well
with the Ulster Museum's
touring exhibition Up In Arms.
This was launched with a lecture
by Dr. Allan Blackstock, Institute
of Irish Studies, QUB on
Yeomen and United Irishmen in
Fermanagh, and traditional music
played on an Irish harp by harpist
Paul Dooley from Co. Clare.


experience at the Museum in addition to developing new education modules. She replaces Jill Mulligan who left to concentrate on her art and interior design work and whom we wish well in her new career.

Women's Oral History Project

Enniskillen Castle is delighted to be associated with Clogher Historical Society women's oral history project. Project researcher, Joan Duffy is based at the Museum and has the use of Museum facilities. This project is managed by Museum Development Officer, Bronagh Cleary and a panel of Clogher Historical Society members; it is funded by Fermanagh District Partnership. Recordings and transcriptions will be available to

researchers at Enniskillen Castle and the Ulster Folk and Transport Museum, Cultra, and will also be the basis for an exhibition in 1999 on the lives of Fermanagh women.





Staff Achievements

Members of staff at the Museum have been successful in gaining various qualifications in the last year.

evelopment Officer Jayne Olphert gained a Postgraduate Diploma and Masters from Leicester University in Museum Studies; fellow Development Officer, Bronagh Cleary achieved a Postgraduate Diploma in Cultural Management from the University of Ulster (Jordanstown); Administrator, Fiona Cathcart passed an HNC with distinction in Travel and Tourism Management from

Fermanagh College and Museum Assistant Adrian Beattie was successful in gaining a Certificate in Museum Studies with a commendation from Queen's University, Belfast.

These qualifications have enhanced the skill base and theoretical knowledge within the Museum of good, modern museum management, visitor and collection care.

Temporary **Documentation Assistant**

For a four week period in August - September 1998 the Museum with grant aid from the Northern Ireland Museums Council employed a temporary documentation assistant to tackle a back log in the paper archives. Brendan

Fitzpatrick did a splendid job and good inroads were made in terms of upgrading documentation on the paper collections and identifying material that required some remedial conservation. He also carried out some preventive conservation making made-to-measure melinex sleeves to store valuable artefacts.

he Fermanagh County Museum at Enniskillen Castle has just won the 1998 Gulbenkian/ Heritage Council Award for Best Smaller Museum. The award, presented by President Mary McAleese at a ceremony in Dublin Castle was received by the chairman of Fermanagh District Council, Mr. Patrick McCaffrey and the museum curator Helen Lanigan Wood. As well as a certificate, there was a prize of £2,500.

The award was made for achievement in display and for good communication. The judges felt that Fermanagh

County Museum is an excellent example of what a local museum should be. 'The displays are excellent with adequate spacing and lighting and good explanatory labelling. There is an overall coherence in the permanent exhibition which provides a remarkable comprehensive picture of Co. Fermanagh through the ages'.

Commenting on the

award, museum curator Helen Lanigan Wood said that she was particularly pleased about the complimentary remarks made by the judges about their welcome at the museum. Visiting the museum anonymously accompanied by children, they were met 'by helpful and enthusiastic staff and the attention of young visitors was held throughout the visit' The Gulbenkian/Heritage

Award for Best Larger Museum was won by another museum in Northern Ireland, the Ulster American Folk Park. These awards which are open to all museums and galleries throughout Ireland have been running for six years. This is the second time that Fermanagh County Museum has won the award for museums with a budget of less that £500,000; it has also won two other Gulbenkian awards, one for Best Customer Care, another for Best Education Project.

iving History

n May Day Bank Holiday, Enniskillen Castle hosted a living history event organised and funded by the Environment and Heritage Service.

For the event visitors were asked to let their imaginations take them back to the late 16th Century when in the year 1594 the Castle was besieged by English forces.

The re-enactment group Clanvisions, displayed the skills of sword fighting, pike drills, musket firing and archery within the



WORLD WIDE

Our main aim in 1999 is to establish ourselves firmly on the Internet. The Museum will be included not only in Fermanagh District Council's website but also on a website produced by a group called Artspark Consortium which promotes arts and museum organisations throughout Northern Ireland.

Artspark Consortium was funded by Co-Operation North (now Co-Operation Ireland) with a view to helping groups such as ourselves to create public access to all aspects of arts and culture. Artspark has enabled groups to publish and manage their own web site. They facilitated us by training members of Fermanagh County Museum's staff in web design as well as supplying us with the equipment and software we need to do this. We hope to have our site fully developed by early 1999.

Another major development for the museum will be the installation of software at our off-site stores to monitor the condition of the museum collections. We will be able to access equipment in these outside stores from our offices in the Museum. This means that we can check on the temperature and humidity on these stores at any time of the day and if problems arise we can set equipment to work to rectify them.

Special * Workshop Events * For Children

Roy King Medieval Armourer

For a week in early May, Roy King and his partner, Jackie Beevis lived and worked within the Castle. He is a talented and experienced craftsman who specialises in making armour from the Norman to the Medieval period. School children had the opportunity to handle and try on some of the weapons and armour and Roy explained to them the history of weapons. He did this in a way that did not glorify violence but sensitively explored this difficult facet of human history.

CLAY POTTERY WORKSHOPS

These workshops are an optional extra within the Life In Early Times module offered to primary schools. Children learn to make pinch and coil pots just as their ancestors did thousands of years ago! They also create patterns using natural materials, anything from feathers to their own finger nails and they draw inspiration from Bronze Age pottery. In the past year the Museum has had replicas made of some of the Bronze Age pots in its collection for use in these workshops.

Entitled Art Insight and aimed at 4-12 year olds, Enniskillen Castle offered a morning tour followed by a 'have a go at' water colour art sessions, which proved very popular. In total almost 200 children got involved.□





We were delighted to host a free event for children visiting from Chernobyl and for their host families from Lisnaskea. The children certainly seemed to enjoy the workshop, especially the messy bits, using dried pulses, pasta, glitter etc. to make up a picture. Everybody then had an opportunity to see around the Museum.

The Museum continued to acquire interesting artefacts, both through donations and purchases, which reflect the history and culture of the county. Key pieces include:

Acquisitions Conations 1997-1998

Three photographic studies by Anne Cassidy (FCM_1998_033, 034, 042). These were purchased by the Association of Friends of the Museum for £180.

A Belleek first period wall plate (FCM_1998_041) purchased with 50% grant aid of £300 from the Northern Ireland Museums Council (NIMC).

Two paintings by Kathleen Bridle, *The East Bridge, Enniskillen, in Winter*, 1945 (FCM_1998_028) and *Fruitshop through Curtained Window, Enniskillen* c.1960 (FCM_1998_027) purchased with 50% grant aid of £250 each from the Northern Ireland Museums Council (NIMC).

An original lithograph in grey and white by William Scott entitled *Still Life - Three Pears and Pan* (FCM_1997-118) was acquired thanks to assistance from the Friends of the National Collections of Ireland who gave £1,167, the Association of Friends of the Museum who donated £583.50 and the remainder of £584 from the Museum's budget.

Important donations have also been made in the last year to the Museum:


Mr. Eric Thomas donated an 18th century marriage document, dated 1778, (FCM 1997 117B).

Mr. Shay Nethercott made a significant donation of his photographic collection, photographs taken by himself as well as those he collected over the years.(FCM_1998_106). Last September a small

selection of this collection was put on display in the exhibition entitled 'Shay Nethercott's Fermanagh' and it proved to be quite a draw with the public, particularly on the weekend of September 12th and 13th when over 300 people gained free admission to the Museum. for the Heritage Open Days

A copy of the new edition of *The Annals of Ulster* was presented to the Museum by the McManus Clan Association on the quincentennial commemoration of the death of its compiler Cathal Og Mac Maghnusa (FCM_1998_095).



The Museum would like to take this opportunity to thank the Friends for their support throughout 1998. □



A great many people braved the miserable December weather on Tuesday 9 December to attend the opening of two exceptional art exhibitions at Fermanagh County Museum. The exhibitions were a selection of photographs by Anne Cassidy entitled Transformations, a glimpse of the way in which flowers are represented in our

lives. The second exhibition was a collection of ceramic and bronze animals by Anthony
Scott, entitled New Sculpture, and mainly inspired by animals from Celtic mythology.
The opening was attended by the Chairman of Fermanagh District Council, Councillor Fergus
McQuillan, who spoke of his pride at viewing such fine

examples of Fermanagh talent. Anne Cassidy's exhibition was opened by Mr. Shay Nethercott, himself an acclaimed photographer, who spoke of Anne's love of photography and her considerable ability. Anthony Scott's exhibition was officially opened by Mrs. Noelle Farry, art advisor to the Western Education and Library Board. She expressed her admiration for Anthony's work and congratulated him on having his sculptures widely collected around the world.



Christianity in Ireland
included a number of important
artefacts from the Museum's
collection - an ogham stone
found at Topped Mountain in Co.
Fermanagh, part of a High Cross
from Killesher, a grave slab with
an Irish inscription form Kilcoo,
near Garrison and full scale
replicas of the celebrated White
Island figures.

A key element of the exhibition was provided by The Ulster History Park who used replicas and reconstructions to show how the Book of Kells was created. A fine copy of the famous manuscript was lent by the Western Education and Library Board.

A new CD programme added an exciting dimension design by the Nerve Centre, Derry in association with the Tower Museum which provided a "visit" to the Virtual Museum of St. Colum Cille.

The exhibition was opened by Mr. Tony Candon, Manager of the Ulster History Park who was welcomed by Mr. Derrick Nixon, Vice - Chairman of Fermanagh District Council. Mrs Rosemary Drawing by Henry Glassie of detail from St. Molaise's Shrine.



The exhibition attracted many local school children who paid particular attention to the intricacies of Celtic art as shown in the Book of Kells. They learned how to do Celtic calligraphy and experienced the richness of early Irish art by applying colour to complex interlace designs. □

This exhibition which opened on June 4th was an important retrospective of the work of Kathleen Bridle, representing her work from 1925 - 1985. Kathleen Bridle was a well - known figure in Northern Irish art and education circles for over half a century until her death in 1989. Her expertise in portraiture was recognised in her early career but she is mainly

sixty years and was a remarkable teacher, including among her pupils the artists T.P. Flanagan and the late William Scott.

The exhibition was opened by the Right Reverend Brian Hannon, Bishop of Clogher, and was also attended by Dr. Carole Durix, the late artist's niece. Dr. Brian Kennedy, Head of Fine and Applied Art at the Ulster

Museum and T.P. Flanagan, who in association with Dr. Durix were responsible for selecting the paintings, also attended the opening.

On the same evening the book *The Life and Art of Kathleen Bridle* was launched. Written by Carole Durix and edited by Helen Lanigan Wood, it contains a forward by T.P. Flanagan. Handsomely published by the Four Courts Press Dublin, it was grant aided by the Arts Council of Northern Ireland. Present at the launch were the Enniskillen born director of the Four Courts Press Michael Adams and the designer of the book Jarlath Hayes.

The exhibition remained on view in Fermanagh until the end of August after which it went on display in the Ulster Museum. It will be shown in Armagh County Museum from 20th January until 27 March 1999.□

although Fermanagh appeared to be unaffected by the Rebellion, it was likely that sympathetic support for the United Irish and Defender movements was strong in the area.
