Irvinestown Wanderers was first formed in 1907 by William Duncan. The pitch was located on the Lack Road. They won many trophies which were displayed on Mr Duncan's window in the town. It took a while for the men to get started again and with the help of Roy Tarbottom they finished runners up in 72/73 season to Enniskillen Rangers and in 1974 they lifted the Mulhern cup and the Coffey cup. In 2001 the Wanderers finally achieved what every junior team dreamed of and lifted the junior cup again. The men lifted this cup again in 2003/04. What an achievement!!!

Another great year for the Wanderers was 1986/87 where they won the Double, Mercer League and Mulhern Cup.

A big year celebrated by all involved with the club was 2007 at their Centenary at the Delaney. They had the privilege of
